Coffee morning at the Mercure Hotel

Our next coffee morning will be on Thursday May 21st



The talk from Roy Smart will be about Wallis Simpson and the crisis in the Royal Family. The room we use is the Hertford Suite 1 which will be open to us from 9.45 with tea, coffee and biscuits. Please help yourselves to refills. The talk will be from commence at 10.30 followed by the raffle. There is no charge, and members are welcome to bring a guest with them. If you come by car, please remember to key in your car registration number to avoid receiving a fine.

Our last coffee morning on March 18th was a talk from Alan Marchant about the Bletchley Park Codebreakers. It was a most interesting talk and Alan has kindly provided a summary of it, as follows;

The story of Bletchley Park (BP) covers the five years of World War Two when it was the home of the Government Code and Cipher School (GC&CS). After the war GC&CS was renamed GCHQ and it moved to Cheltenham.

The origins of GC&CS were in Room 40 of the Admiralty where Dilly Knox, Nigel de Grey and Alistair Denniston made Britain the world leader in Signals Intelligence (SIGINT). Now decoded the Zimmerman Telegram which changed the course of World War One. He would be the father codebreaker at BP, 20 years later.

In the 1920s the Enigma enciphering machine was invented by German electrical engineer Arthur Scherbius. Only a machine would be capable of deciphering messages produced by Enigma with its 106 sextillion possible Key Settings. It was first broken by Polish mathematician Rejewski. He and his colleagues at the Polish Cipher Bureau invented a machine, they called a Bombe, to attack the new German military version of Enigma.

In September 1938, with war brewing, GC&CS re-located to Bletchley Park under the cover of Captain Ridley's Shooting Party. The following year would be spent recruiting a new breed of codebreakers. Eventually there would be over 9,000 people at BP, the vast majority being young women who dedicated their time to the world's first Intelligence Factory.

There were several women codebreakers, Joan Clarke, Margaret Rock, Jane Fawcett and Mavis Batey (nee Lever) all made vital decrypts of Enigma messages which led to military victories.

Gordon Welchman was the master-mind and architect of this integrated industrial scale codebreaking operation. He was a pioneer in the use and deployment of metadata. His command of Traffic Analysis produced the Ultra intelligence, which would help win the war.

Y Stations were finding and intercepting Enigma's morse coded messages on the increasingly crowded airwaves. Women dispatch riders took the de-morsed messages to BP for processing. Over 3000 messages a day were delivered to BP.

Traffic Analysis was giving BP much vital intelligence but it was the Welchman-Turing Bombe (based on the Polish prototype) which developed the necessary efficiency to attack Enigma.

The men and women in the growing number of Huts were helped by the technical weaknesses of Enigma, but more significantly, by the human errors of the German operators.

Alan Turing, already a mathematician of world renown, thrived at BP. Its 'Silicon Valley' working philosophy allowed his mind to roam and create. Turing knew machines could eventually 'imitate' humans.

The Japanese School, an educational masterpiece, set up by John Tiltman in Bedford was yet another example of the ingenuity and dedication displayed by the men and women of BP.

When a letter was sent to Churchill in late 1941 requesting greater resources, his famous reply was 'Action This Day'. From then on, numerous large brick-built blocks replaced the makeshift huts as the centre of operations. In the Summer of 1941 the Y Stations had begun hearing strange new sounds on the busy airwaves. It was the Lorenz cipher, which BP called Tunny. The messages it produced was called Fish. Fish traffic was at German High Command level and its messages were longer, more detailed and carried strategic intelligence of utmost importance.

The Newmanny Department at BP was tasked with devising the automated means to produce Ultra from Fish following the staggering achievement of Bill Tutte in uncovering its complexities. He understood the inner workings of Tunny without ever having seen the machine.

BP's decrypts led to the sinking of the Bismarck and victory at El-Alamein. By early 1943, BP was on the way to achieving complete information dominance.

Eric Jones, Head of Hut 3, a brilliant modern manager of people and systems, was the spider at the centre of the complex information web. The Western Front Committee mapped the Order of Battle of all of Hitler's 58 Panzer Divisions in Western Europe. This was where D Day was planned. BP knew as much about the Nazi military machine as Berlin High Command.

The Heath Robinsons were replaced by GPO's Tommy Flowers designed Colossus, the world's first programmable, electronic, digital computer. Colossus Mark 1 arrived in January and Mark II was delivered just in time for the D Day invasion - Operation Overlord. BP was now at the heart of even wider intelligence gathering.

The fusion of SIGINT with Human Intelligence (HUMINT) saw BP inventing modern intelligence gathering.

Operation Fortitude was to mislead the enemy about the timing, location and scale of the invasion. BP's Tunny and Enigma decrypts would confirm to SHAEF (led by Eisenhower) that Hitler had been entirely deceived.

On the morning of the invasion BP could confirm that the Germans did no idea at all that Normandy was about to be besieged. The protection that BP afforded the invading fleet was key to D Day's success.

Intelligence did not win the campaign. Soldiers still had to fight, of course, but BP gave them their best chance of winning.

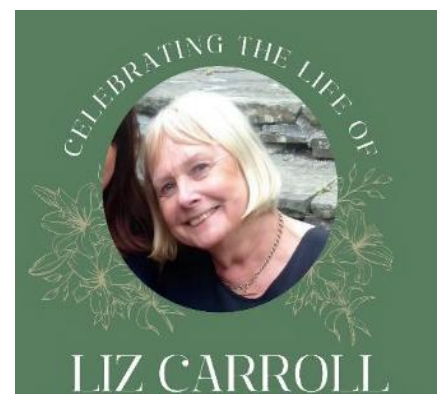


OBITUARIES
